Outstanding Offensive Player of the Week

Jordan Yantz – Quarterback – Vancouver Island Raiders

If the experts thought that the VI Raiders potent offence was limited to Andrew Harris, quarterback Jordan Yantz proved them wrong Sunday. Yantz dissected the Okanagan Sun defence in leading his club to a 43-3 thrashing of the Sun at the Apple Bowl. Yantz posted stellar numbers, (17 of 26 passing, 375 yards, 3 TDS & 1INT) as his club handed Okanagan its worst home field loss ever. The experts might now be considering booking their hotel rooms for a Canadian Bowl in Nanaimo with Jordan Yantz peaking as the play-offs approach.



Outstanding Defensive Player of the Week
Matt Lalande – Linebacker – Edmonton Wildcats

It was a record setting Sunday in the Edmonton snow for the 3-year-veteran as he intercepted 2 Calgary passes and returned both for touchdowns in the Wildcats 35-20 victory. His first major came on a 57-yard 1st quarter dash and followed that up with a 20-yard return the gave the home side a 22-14 lead & much needed breathing room. The pair of scores set a new PFC playoff record for interception touchdowns in a game and tied the existing CJFL record which was first set by Larry Wilson of the Burlington Braves on November 7, 1971.



Outstanding Special Teams Player of the Week
Scott Leblanc – Kicker – St Leonard Cougars

Scott was awarded his second award of 2009 as the Cougars defeated the Burlington Braves 52-7 to close out the regular season. The rookie out of Rimouski Cegep scored 22 points on his own for a conference leading 67 points. The 5'6" 170 pounder was good on 6 of his 7 field goal attempts. His longest was 37 yards. As well he converted 4 of St Leonard's 5 touchdowns. He punted once for 40 yards and booted 7 kick offs for 367 yards. Sunday morning Scott was selected as the OFC All Star place kicker by the Head Coaches.

The regular season is over! Now the fun begins!

After being away 14 years playing in another league the Ottawa Sooners showed some of their old form and clinched first place and home field advantage throughout the OFC playoffs. The Sooners travelled to London and came away 7-6 victors. Ottawa's TD was scored by Corey Armstrong after he fell on a Beefs fumble deep in the end zone after a missed Sooners' field goal attempt. London scored on two Zack Medeiros field goals.

The St Leonard Cougars recovered from an early 7-0 Burlington Braves lead to win 52-7, securing third place. Cougars' kicker Scott Leblanc amassed 22 points on 6 field goals and 4 converts.

The Windsor AKO Fratmen who missed the OFC playoffs for the first time since 1976 over powered the visiting Hamilton Hurricanes with a 24-13 victory.

The fourth place London Beefeaters will travel to Ottawa for a 7:00 pm kick off against the first place Sooners at Keith Harris Stadium on the Carleton University campus.

Second place Hamilton Hurricanes entertain the third place St Leonard Cougars at 4:00 pm at Ivor Wynne Stadium, also Saturday.

Following the final regular season games the coaches of the six Ontario Football Conference teams assembled to select the 2009 OFC All Stars and Major Award winners.

Highlighting the selections is Aram Eisho of the Hamilton Hurricanes. Aram was selected as the OFC's Outstanding Defensive Player of the Year for the second consecutive year. As well he was selected an All Star at linebacker and he is the leader in defensive points with 156.5. Aram is the reigning Canadian Junior Football League Defensive Player of the Year.

The Outstanding Offensive Player of the Year is Ricky Simons of the Windsor AKO Fratmen. Ricky was the unanimous selection for All Star quarterback. Simons led the OFC with a 99.64 QB efficiency rating.

London's Brad Winder was selected as Coach of the Year and will be the OFC's nominee for the Canadian Junior Football League's Gord Currie coach of the Year award.

Also returning as OFC All Stars are Andrew Lobsinger of Hamilton Hurricanes at offensive line, Ryan Perry of the St Leonard Cougars at linebacker and Miguel Wason of the London Beefeaters at defensive back.

PFC Semi Finals in Review

Calgary Colts - 20 @ Edmonton Wildcats – 35

The provincial capital hosted a semi-final edition of The Battle Of Alberta. The teams split their pair of regular season contests. The Wildcats getting a 35-21 home win on August 8, while the Colts gained revenge with a 24-10 home win August 23.

The home side would bust out of the blocks at the 2:40 mark of the opening quarter as LB Matt Lalande would get his 1st of 2 interceptions at the Edmonton 53 & take it all the way back 57 yards for a 7-0 lead.

But that lead would disappear in a flash as Calgary kick-returner Robbie Morgan took a Ben Hnidan kick 100 yards for the tying score.

Hnidan would be wide on a 34-yard field goal try to give the Cats an 8-7 lead after 1.

The lone score of the second stanza would come at the 11:07 mark as Colt pivot Jeremy Long capped off a 6-play, 77-yard drive with a 1-yard plunge to give the visitors a 14-8 halftime edge as the snow would come down.

After halting Calgary on their 1st drive of the 2nd half, the Wildcats took advantage of a short field with Justin McEvoy putting Edmonton back in front to stay 15-14, thanks to a 3-yard run. A little over a minute later, Lalande would get his 2nd interception and take it 20 yards for his 2nd 6-pointer of the afternoon & a 22-14 lead. That 2nd score gave Lalande ownership of the PFC record & a share of the CJFL mark for interception touchdowns in a playoff game.

Calgary responded with an 8-play, 80-yard drive which ended with a Kevan Hafichuk chipshot from 13 yards out to cut the deficit to 5. Hnidan would connect from 35 yards away to give Edmonton an 8-point lead, but Hafichuk hit his 2nd placement from 26 yards out on the final play of the frame.

An early Wildcat drive yielded Hnidan his 2nd field-goal of the game to restore the eight point edge, then McEvoy would send his club to the title game with his 2nd major score on a 3-yard run to give Edmonton a 35-20 triumph.

It was not a great day for either of the 3 passers in the game as neither threw for a major score. For Calgary, Jeremy Long would go 6 of 11 for 100 yards and throw a pair of picks. Clayton Masikewich would complete 6 of 18 for 70 yards and 3 interceptions.

Edmonton's Andy Pilon only completed 10 of 25 passes for 105 yards.

Shane Dignum had 5 catches for 66 yards for Calgary, while Kevin Wuthrich would put the grips on 6 grabs for 71 yards.

Long was the Colts leading rusher with 62 yards on 8 carries, while McEvoy ran a dozen times for 47 yards.

In addition to Lalande's huge 22 Defensive Point day, DB David Berg also had a 60-yard interception return. Corbin Sharun & Tanner Lestus would also have a pick-off each. Jordan Colebrook at 14 DPTS, with 7 tackles.

Regina Thunder - 24 @ Saskatoon Hilltops - 30

The 2nd half of Semi-Final Sunday played out at Saskatoon's Gordie Howe Bowl. As was the case in the first two meetings which the clubs split, the third would provide a good-sized amount of suspense. It was -3 at game time, with a light northwest wind giving a windchill of -7.

Brendan Larmour would put the brakes on the opening Thunder drive, intercepting Wyatt Catley at the Hilltop 51 & taking it back to the Regina 38 yard-line. The drive would go nowhere & a Michael Waldron miss on a 27-yard attempt would be run out of the end zone.

Regina's next drive would go nowhere and a short Ben Koot punt didn't help matters much as the Hilltops set up shop at the Thunder 25. Six plays later, Regan Schuler would open the scoring with a 1-yard TD run.

The Thunder offense was stymied again, forcing Koot to give up a safety as they were perched on their 4-yard line.

After halting a Saskatoon drive near the end of the 1st quarter, Catley would march his club 96 yards in 17 plays, taking over 9 minutes. The culmination of the long drive was a touchdown reception by Jay Smith to pull Regina to within a pair at 9-7. That would be your halftime score.

The Regina offense would once again drive downfield early in the 3rd with Jay Smith pulling in another clutch catch in Hilltops territory on a 2nd down play. On another 2nd down play, Saskatoon defender Mike Prebble would be called for pass interference. Two plays later, Catley found Camille Lagimodiere with a 5-yard strike to give the visitors a 14-9 lead. That lead though would be shortlived as RB Steve Grenier would lay out and get his mitts on a deflected ball in the Regina end-zone to restore the Saskatoon lead on an 8-play, 58-yard drive. Ben Cressman would intercept a Catley pass and the Hilltops would take full advantage as Schuler would pick up his 2nd rushing major of the game to give Saskatoon a 9-point lead at 23-14.

The 'Tops looked to have sealed the deal with 6:10 left as Brayden Klimosko bulled his way into the Thunder end-zone to make it 30-14, wrapping up a 7-play, 55-yard drive. But cue Catley & the cavalry as he quickly moved downfield and connected with Lagimodiere with 2:47 left to make it 30-20. Mike Scheinbein would reel in the two-point convert to make it a one score game. A Koot onside boot wouldn't work as the bounce he had hoped for didn't materialize. The Regina defense forced a quick two-and-out, followed by Hilltop punter Chris Bodnar conceding a safety to set up an interesting finish. Catley again drove his club to the Saskatoon 20, but a last play toss for Lagimodiere went incomplete. That enables the Hilltops to host the PFC Final against the Edmonton Wildcats next Sunday afternoon.

Catley completed 29 of 44 for 305 yards, throwing for 3 majors, but also 4 interceptions. Smith had 7 catches for 93 yards. Lagimodiere had 7 grabs for 81, while Kolten Solomon had 8 for 71.

Brennan Kasbrick ran for 23 yards on only 8 carries.

Landon Perra had 17 DPTS on 5 tackles, 2 assists, 1 sack & a forced fumble.

Chase Bradshaw completed 12 of 22 for 166 yards with a TD and an interception. Regan Schuler ran for 99 yards on 23 carries and a major. Mitch Stevens hauled in 4 balls for 63 yards.

On defense, Corbin Eskelson had 25 DPTS, picking up 8 tackles, 4 assists, a special teams assist and a 5-yard interception return.

Ben Cressman had 21 of his own, thanks to 2 interceptions, 3 tackles, 5 assists and a pass knockdown.

PFC Final Preview

Edmonton Wildcats (6-2) @ Saskatoon Hilltops (7-1) Sunday October 18th at Gordie Howe Bowl at 1:00 pm

The top 2 clubs in the Prairie Football Conference will "grab grass and growl" for the PFC Championship Sunday afternoon at Saskatoon's Gordie Howe Bowl. Let's take a look at the principals.

Edmonton Wildcats –

Regular Season Record: 6-2, 2nd 324 PF, 163 PA

How They Punched Their Sunday Ticket: Defeated the Calgary Colts 35-20 in semi-final last Sunday.

Who to Keep an Eye on:

WR Kevin Wuthrich:

There is a reason he also goes by the moniker "Cash". The leading receiver in the conference had 8 touchdowns to go along with his 57 catches for 837 yards.

WR Jerit Lambert:

The Wildcats possess one of the best receiving corps top to bottom in the conference and the rookie has contributed greatly to that. Lambert had 28 grabs for 457 yards and 5 touchdowns.

LB Matt Lalande:

If an opposing quarterback's errant pass hits the linebacker's hands, it's a good bet that mistake will wind up in his end-zone. Lalande intercepted a pair of passes in the regular season & ran them both back for scores. He intercepted 2 Calgary throws in the semi-final & returned them both for touchdowns. That feat set a new conference record for interception scores in a playoff game & tied a nearly 38-year-old CJFL record.

The Wildcard:

The Wildcats kick & punt return teams are arguably the best in the conference as Lambert was the conference leader in kickoff returns while averaging 33.3 yards per return & scoring a 105-yard touchdown, while David Berg led in punt return yards with 283 & took one back for a 67-yard score in the season-opening win vs. Calgary.

The Skinny:

If the ball hawks on the Wildcat defense come through yet again on Sunday afternoon, it'll be one very happy return trip to the City of Champions.

Saskatoon Hilltops –

Regular Season Record: 7-1 1st, 239 PF, 134 PA,

How They Punched Their Sunday Ticket: Defeated Regina Thunder 30-24 in semi-final last Sunday.

Who to Keep an Eye On:

RB Regan Schuler:

Much has been made about how Schuler found his way into the Hilltops' backfield, but from his 1st start in the 2008 semi-final win versus Winnipeg, he has fit the role of go-to guy to a T. The 3rd-year back won the conference rushing title, running for 819 yards and scoring 3 touchdowns.

QB Chase Bradshaw:

Bradshaw will make his 4th start of the campaign in Sunday's final. Bradshaw threw for 1,022 yards & 11 TD's in 2009 and has played very well since assuming the starting role from struggling 6th-year pivot Jordan Penner. Another strong day will go a long way to securing the three-peat for the Hilltops.

LB Corbin Eskelson:

The 4th-year veteran has come on strong in the 2nd half of the year to eke past teammate Craig Albert and into 4th in the defensive points category with 105. When you combine his tackles & assists, he ranked 3rd this season in the conference. He racked up 25 points in the semi-final win.

The Wildcard:

The Hilltops downed the Wildcats 35-14 in the lone head-to-head contest in Edmonton back on August 22nd as they opened up a 3-game road trip with the triumph.

The Skinny:

Should Saskatoon finally be able to get that elusive all-around team effort on Sunday that should put them over the top and gain the three-peat, especially if Bradshaw & company fire on all cylinders.

BCFC Review - Week Eleven

Three games took place in the BCFC in week eleven.

South Surrey Big Kahuna Rams defeated the Vancouver Trojans by a 59-19 score at Burnaby Lakes last Saturday. Coupled with the Sun loss on Sunday, the Rams victory assured the Rams of a second place finish. The Rams were led by running back Errol Brooks who rushed for 196 yards on 13 carries. Defensively, the Rams who held the Trojans to 30 yard rushing were led by Jordan Linnen who had two tackles, 2 assisted tackles, 3-batted balls and an interception that he returned 36-yards for the touchdown.

The Trojans, whose record dropped to one win against eight losses, set a team record for total passing yards in a game with 409. Leading the way was Mr. Consistency Mike Chayka. Mike finished with eight receptions for 169 yards and one touchdown. Griffin Bullock also had a fine night catching passes, as he finished with four receptions for 140 yards and two touchdowns. Andy Dobbs who had three tackles, one assist, one batted ball and an interception, led the Trojans on the defensive side.

Also on Saturday night, the Chilliwack Huskers took their 3 and 5 record to Kamloops were they came out on the short end of a 33 to 0 loss. For the Broncos, their last game of the year, the win was sweet. It gave the Broncos their second victory of the season and a sixth place finish. Leading the way for the Broncos, who had their best rushing game of the season, was QB Leam Wear. Leam led the team in rushing with 93 yards on ten carries and a touchdown. With his arm he threw 12 passes completing three for 41 yards. Defensively, Tyler Lee led the Broncos with 16 defensive points coming from 3 tackles, 2 assisted tackles and 2 interceptions. The leading scorer was Gabe Ord who kicked four field goals and three converts. His longest field goal came from 34 yards out.

The Huskers, who suffered their sixth loss of the year could only generate 180 yards of total offense and turned the ball over seven times. The Huskers were led by running back Matt Peterson who had 112 yards on 22 carries and a touchdown. Defensively, Joe Klyne and Jonathan Abril led the way. Joe finished with four tackles, one assisted tackle, one QB sack, one batted ball and a fumble recovery. Jonathan led both teams with seven tackles.

The game of the weekend took place on Sunday at Kelowna's Apple Bowl between the undefeated Vancouver Island Raiders and the Okanagan Sun.
